YOUTH VAPING

WHAT ARE THE DANGERS?

By now you are probably aware that e-cigarette use or "vaping" is dangerous for youth. But do you know what makes e-cigarettes unsafe? This month we will explore what is in an e-cigarette and the impact they can have on the adolescent brain and body.

What's in a Vape??

The liquid used in e-cigarettes does not contain any water, but has many other substances that are known to be harmful for humans. These substances can include:

- **Nicotine:** Highly-addictive, especially for young people; very toxic if inhaled, swallowed, or if it comes into contact with the skin; increases heart rate and blood pressure and can cause dizziness, nausea, and stomach pain. Nicotine is found in 99% of e-cigarette juices, even in some products that claim to be 0% nicotine.
- **Propylene glycol:** Also found in antifreeze, artificial smoke/fog and food coloring; causes irritation of the throat, nose and eyes; potentially toxic to the liver and kidney over long term exposure.
- Formaldehyde: Also found in embalming fluid, nail
 polish and foam insulation; can cause irritation to
 the nose, eyes, skin, and throat; also linked to
 increased risk of certain types of cancer.
- Flavoring chemicals: Many of the flavors used in vape juice are rated "safe for human consumption."
 This means these substances have been found safe for eating and entering our gut and digestive system but that does not mean they are safe for inhalation into the lungs. One common flavoring ingredient is diacetyl, which can cause the irreversible lung condition Popcorn Lung.
- **Lead:** prolonged exposure can lead to abdominal pain, constipation, depression, irritability and nausea; effects children more than adults; can cause developmental and neurological effects
- And many others!

Vaping and the Adolescent Brain

Young people are more susceptible to the harmful brain effects of e-cigarette use than adults due in large part to brain development (or lack of). The brain develops in stages with the first parts to develop controlling physical activity, emotion and motivation. These parts of the brain are more focused on survival and reward. The last part of the brain to develop controls impulse control, reasoning and judgement. Introducing drugs into the adolescent brain can slow or even stop normal development.

Because of how the brain normally develops, the teenage brain has been compared to a car with a gas pedal but no breaks! Adolescents often find it hard to control their emotions and use good judgement, while being more prone to exhibit risky and impulsive behaviors in search of pleasure.

The underdeveloped adolescent brain is also more susceptible to addiction. Research consistently shows that one of the best ways to avoid addiction is to delay the first use of substances.

Hello everyone!! Maybe it doesn't feel like it to you, but for me, time is flying! It is incredible that we are already at Thanksgiving and Christmas is just around the corner. While Covid continues to be at the forefront of most people's conversations, influenza is also making its appearance in the state. The SD Department of Health is reporting 37 confirmed cases of influenza in the state as well as 3 probable cases. These numbers will likely go up by the time this is sent out. It is NOT too late for a flu shot if you haven't already gotten one!

Tidbits from the COVID COORDINATOR

COVID-19: Calculating Isolation and Quarantine

One of the more difficult aspects of the COVID-19 pandemic is figuring out how long you will be required to quarantine or isolate in situations where you either test positive or are a close contact to someone who tested positive. We receive questions regarding these issues frequently.

Isolation is the term used for those who are infected with COVID-19 and must be separated from others while they are potentially infectious. People in isolation should stay home until it is safe for them to be around others. The CDC defines release from isolation criteria for those infected with SARS-CoV-2 as: at least 10 days from when symptoms first appeared AND at least 24 hours fever free AND symptom improvement. This means if you test positive for COVID-19, you should look back to the day when your symptoms started and remain isolated until 10 calendar days have passed since that date and all other criteria is met . The Department of Health will talk you through these dates and discuss your symptoms with you to determine when it is safe for you to go around others again.

Quarantine keeps someone who may have been exposed to COVID-19 away from others. According to the CDC, quarantine helps prevent the spread of disease that can occur before a person realizes they are sick. If you were around someone (within 6 feet for 15 minutes or more) who was diagnosed with COVID-19, the CDC recommends 14 days away from others. West Central School District's policy for close contacts: if a student was exposed to someone with COVID-19 while wearing a mask at school, they do not have to quarantine at home and may attend school and school functions as long as they have **NO** symptoms **AND** wear a mask. The school highly recommends those close contacts who were exposed without a mask outside of school, or with a known case of COVID-19 in the home, to follow quarantine directives given by the SD Department of Health. The length of this quarantine will be 14 days from the day the student was last within 6 feet for 15 minutes or longer to the person who tested positive.

The South Dakota Department of Health has a quarantine and isolation calculator that can be useful in determining the dates you or your student will need to isolate/quarantine. This can be found at https://doh.sd.gov/COVID/Calculator/default.aspx.





MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

Wow! Where have the first few months of the school year gone? Folks say that time flies when you are having fun. We must be having loads of fun. Perhaps those months flying by just means that we have been busy.

What has been keeping us busy? Well, the obvious has been the constant adjustment of procedures for Covid-19. But, we have also been busy with the ongoing review learning data and switching from Empower to Infinite Campus.

Our procedures for dealing with Covid-19 remain fluid. Staff continue to clean desks and frequently-touched surfaces often throughout the days. Students and staff continue to be required to wear masks. Hand sanitation is encouraged frequently throughout the day with hand sanitation stations located in the rooms and throughout the building. Students are spaced as best we can in the classrooms.

Most agree that students need to be in school to provide the most effective opportunity for them to learn. When students can't be in school, the next most effective way for them to learn is by them engaging in learning from home. One of the greatest challenges is to keep learning moving forward for students who miss multiple days after testing positive for Covid-19 and students who are considered close contacts and stay out of school for extended days. Regardless of the reason students are out for extended days, when students are well enough to engage in learning, they must engage. Students have access to learning materials through Google Classroom, Infinite Campus and other tools. Teachers post assignments and communicate with students when they are out. Parents should contact teachers if their children are struggling with content or accessing materials.

Keeping learning moving forward is directly linked to attendance and the data reviewed by staff. All parents should have received a copy of the Fall NWEA assessments. Overall, the achievement data shows that our middle school students out grew their peers from across the country. The results indicate that while not ideal, our distance learning from last March through May was reasonably effective. We will continue to monitor student progress and make adjustments to instruction based upon the results for the next two NWEA benchmark assessments.

Reviewing data is also possible through the use of Infinite Campus. We do this by monitoring student master of standards through assignments and assessments. The report card in Campus provides students and parents a summary of learning in the quarter. A closer inspection of the learning can be done by looking at mastery scores in the grade book portion of Parent Portal. Please contact your child's teachers if you have questions regarding assignments and assessments.

As always, please contact me if you have questions or concerns. Thank you for all you are doing to help your child be successful in school.

HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

NEWS FROM WEST CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL - December 2020 - January 2021 Principal: Melinda Jensen 605-528-6236.

Hello Parents and WCHS Community:

I know many people are looking forward to the end of 2020 and its challenges. Let's take time to reflect on some of the GOOD things, too: January, February, and March in school with WCHS students; a wonderful graduation ceremony for class of 2020; we were back to school in August, and fall activities were "almost" normal ... even though we might have to look a little harder, 2020 had many positive moments, too!

I just counted: we are 19 school days away from Christmas vacation and 23 school days from the end of our first semester on January 8.

SEMESTER TEST DAYS are scheduled for January 7 and 8. High school teachers and upper class-men/women students offer <u>study sessions</u> for the Semester Tests. Teachers will announce those opportunities to their students, and I will talk about them on daily announcements. HS students are encouraged to use all their resources and do their very best.

I am writing this newsletter on **Nov 20th**. We have been Distance Learning for one week and most HS students are doing well.. At this point in time, plans are to return to school on November 30th. You will be notified if things change.

Observations about being ON-LINE:

- It is NOT confusing for HS students once they get the hang of a new schedule. They know exactly what to do to log in, attend Zooms, and keep pace with teachers' expectations. Please don't let them tell you differently! Students must persist; if they need help, they should email teachers.
- 2. Teachers are working **IN** school (even when students are online). We have 20-130 students **in** the HS building each day. Some students stay all day; some stay 2-3 hours; some come in for band; some work in construction class, take a test, work on projects, or get more help from teachers. If your son/daughter is behind send him/her to school.
- 3. If you do **not** have dependable internet, **send your child to school**. We will not excuse missing work, missing attendance, or neglecting responsibilities because of internet issues. Some students need to come to school and spend the day here!
- 4. Attendance is taken **EVERY** day. Your son/daughter knows that. Attendance is taken by attending Zoom, handing in assignments ON TIME, and completing a daily assignment. If students neglect attendance, they are marked absent just like attendance expectations while they are in school.
- 5. WCHS attendance policy (p. 8 student handbook) "If a student accumulates **more than 6** absences from a class per semester, a student may be removed from the class (regardless of the grade). If removed from a class, the student's grade is WF (withdraw fail) and no credit is given."

NWEA, MAP Test. I hope you've seen your son/daughter's MAP test results for grades 9-11 (our second year). Administrators presented grade-level results to the School Board in November and results indicated that distance learning last Spring did not have a negative impact on overall student learning.

The second round of tests (to measure students' growth since the beginning of the year) are scheduled January 19-20-21. I will send an email when those dates get closer. These tests compare our students' progress with the progress of millions of other high school students at the same date in the school year. This year they also measure your child's growth since last year. Take time to discuss the results with your son/daughter.

Another measure of success in high school is the **ACT test**, a curriculum-based measure of college readiness - including tests in English, math, reading, science, and writing. On average, about 75% of WCHS students per graduating class take the test during their junior and senior year. WCHS **2020 test average was 22.34** (state average 21.82).

Please encourage your son/daughter to follow safety guidelines to slow the spread of Covid:

- 1. Wear a mask (over nose and mouth)
- 2. Wash hands frequently
- 3. Practice social distancing
- 4. Don't take chances with your health or others be responsible.
- 5. If you feel sick stay home
- 6. Keep abreast of updated requirements and recommendations
 Also, let us know if your son/daughter has tested positive to the Covid virus.

LIBRARY NEWS


THEY'VE FOUND THE GOLDEN TICKET!

This October, West Central FCCLA carried out the tradition of Socktober. Each year the West Central FCCLA chapter partners with the school and community to collect new socks for the homeless. Many homeless walk miles daily to access food, water, and essentials. It only takes 30 minutes to get frostbite in sub-zero temperatures. With this information, our FCCLA chapter finds that providing socks to those in need is very important, especially with the hard times we are in right now.

Seniors, Kenadee Hackett and Taylor Even took on the role of leading Socktober this year. Together with the rest of the chapter, they made posters and presentations to inform all high school and middle

In past years, the results haven't been up to the standards that FCCLA holds for themselves, but this year was different. With the help of students, staff, and the community, we were able to collect 3,079 pairs of socks. These socks will be donated to St. Francis House, Union Gospel, Children's Home Society, and Children's Inn. We want to thank everyone for their participation in this year's Socktober, and we hope that we can continue on this high note for many more years!
